### Finding My Home with the Franciscans

My name is Meryl Weiss and I am a Registered Nurse for St.

Francis Home Hospice Program in Honolulu, Hawaii. I have been working for the Sisters of St. Francis on and off for the past 19 years. The Sisters have touched my life, inspired me, and helped to mold me into the person I am today.



In 1997, after a vacation in Hawaii, my husband, two young children, and I decided to leave New York and the dream house we had just built, to pursue living in Hawaii. With a graduate degree in Gerontological Nursing from Hunter College in Manhattan, I was able to get a job at St. Francis Medical Center in Honolulu as a Geriatric Clinic Nurse Specialist. On my first day there, I was greeted by Franciscan Sisters Bea and Gretchen. Being from a Jewish background, I had never met a nun before. What did I know? I was scared to death!! What I soon found out after was that they were warm and loving, stern and compassionate. There was a certain energy there. It is hard to explain how I felt safe and loved, respected and nurtured.

During the 5 years that I worked there, I spent a lot of time at St. Francis Convent in Manoa helping another Franciscan nun, Sister Petra care for the elderly Sisters who had geriatric related concerns. I found the convent to be a calm and serene place. Professionally, I was extremely satisfied. I led such teams as Restraint Reduction, Fall Prevention, and Pressure Ulcer Prevention. I was also able to do research on Pain Assessment in the cognitively impaired patient and was inducted into the Nursing Honor Society, Sigma Theta Tau. I was always encouraged to do my best and be my best. I learned the true definition of joy, simplicity, peacemaking, and charity. The environment was very spiritual and calm. I learned to slow down and enjoy each and every day.

In 2001, after an unexpected death in the family, we made an impulsive decision to move back to New York. The next 3 years I cried almost every day. Not only because I missed Hawaii, but because I missed the Sisters so much. Yes, this Jewish girl from NY cried for the Sisters of St. Francis in Honolulu, Hawaii! There was only one thing to do and that was to go back to them! This time I was hired by Sister Alicia Damien as Director of Nursing of a Long Term Care Facility where she was the COO. I hadn't met her before. She was strict and professional and very "by the book", or else! I learned more from her than anyone else in my life! I admire her very much. Eventually however, it was time to return to the St. Francis Health Care System; this time as a Hospice Nurse.

It is an honor, and I am grateful to work with the patients and families bringing them comfort and support at this period of their lives. There is nothing better. Working in Hospice has brought me the gift that is Sister Patricia. She is my mentor and my friend. Always there to provide love and encouragement, and most recently Sister Chris, "the rebel" and my friend. She makes me laugh and brings me joy. In 2011, I became a Franciscan Associate, with my Recommitment Service this past November, 2014. I am now, truly home.



St. Francis Hospital School of Nursing opened in 1929, graduating 824 successful nurses by 1966.

The OSF's Neumann opened and operated some of the first general hospitals in the U.S., instituting cleanliness standards which influenced the development of America's modern hospital system.

OSF Sisters serve in 12 states, the
District of Columbia, the Commonwealth of
Puerto Rico, as well as in Kenya and Peru

Canonized Oct. 21, 2012, St. Marianne Cope, OSF, is the first Franciscan woman from North America and the 11th American to be declared a saint.
