Best Practices for Energizing Volunteers at the Parish Level and Throughout the Church

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Focus on:

- **1. Stewardship as a way of life**
- 2. Best practice research on parish stewardship
- **3. A parish organized stewardship effort**
- 4. Individual and parish based hospitality and community building
- **5. Stewardship messaging year round**
- **6. Gifts discernment**

NOTE: View time and talent as a ministry not merely a volunteer activity.

Stewardship as a Way of Life

- Based on individual's need to give out of gratitude – spiritual way of life – conversion process.
- Stewardship is intentional, planned, and proportionate giving.

Stewardship as a Way of Life

- Based on fact that each person has been given unique gifts and talents from God. Part of our calling is to discern, develop, and use those gifts.
- Stewardship is part of our own religious education.

Best Practices in Parish Stewardship

1. Be a welcoming parish



- **2. Appoint a stewardship council**
- **3. Include stewardship as vital part of parish plan**
- 4. Emphasize stewardship in all parish formation and education programs
- **5. Provide the opportunity for lay witness presentations**

Best Practices in Parish Stewardship



- 6. Encourage parishioners to make a pledge
- 7. Communicate with parishioners on stewardship
- 8. Remember, good stewardship starts in the parish house

Note: Changing the parish environment energizes ministers/volunteers more than any individual work to recruit volunteers According to additional research from Charles Zech, we want to minimize the use of "volunteers."

- **From Volunteerism/Volunteers**
- to Ministry/Ministers
- From Time and Talents narrowly defined as special skills
- to Gifts for Ministry, broadly defined to include one's personality, life experiences, strengths
- From Staff and other leaders "do ministry"
- to Staff and other leaders empower people and facilitate ministry

From Focus on tasks, recruitment, and filling slots

- to Focus on people, understanding the many aspects of gifts-based ministry
- From Volunteering is a duty
- to Ministry is a loving response to our baptismal call wherein we were gifted by God

- From Volunteering is only for the minority of people who are heavily involved in the parish
- to Ministry is both a responsibility and a right of all the baptized

- From Volunteers "own" their time and talents and control how they are used
- to Ministers are stewards of their gifts and use discernment to cooperate with God's plan for their use

- From Volunteering is only for the "chosen few" who are in the inner circle
- to Ministry in the Church is diverse and inclusive, welcoming, inviting and open to all

- From There is a scarcity of people and skills and a competition for them
- to God blesses the parish with an abundance of gifts sufficient for carrying out its mission in the world

- From Spirituality is a part of our lives evidenced on Sundays and during prayer
- to Spirituality is lived daily by faithful stewards. It defines all of the actions of disciples of Christ .

Serving

Hours given per week to help and serve others in my community

Inviting

In the last month, I have invited someone to participate in my parish

Giving

Percentage of income and actual dollars given to the parish Life Satisfaction

Overall, I am extremely satisfied with the way things are going in my personal life

Spiritual Commitment

- Reflects a personal depth of spirituality
- Individual in nature
- Seen in both attitudes and behaviors



What is Engagement?

- Communal in Nature
- Am I Valued?
- Do I Make a Meaningful Contribution?
- It is NOT the same as involvement!

What Can Make a Difference?

- If you want people to be more spiritually committed, help them to become more engaged.
- Engagement is ACTIONABLE.
