Peace be with you!



May the Lord bless all of you in this new year!



(July 1, 2019-June 30, 2020):





Approaching the pandemic with flexibility, creativity

By the grace of God and through the hard work of our principals, most of Hawaii Catholic Schools began face-to-face instruction in August. We are blessed to have smaller, close-knit environments to create the “bubbles of safety” required by the State. Parents help make this work. Very few children have been infected with COVID-19 through community transmission, but there have been no outbreaks in the schools.

Flexibility, courage and creativity have been the hallmarks of our school communities through this pandemic. Schools had to adjust to teaching in different ways. Extra-curricular activities have evolved. It is through service, outreach and church celebrations that we see our children actively express their faith.

Here are two examples of how Catholic schools help our children thrive:

To commemorate its 25th anniversary, Holy Family Early Learning Center is organizing monthly service projects. In August, it donated 116 pet towels to the Hawaiian Humane Society. In September, a “Quarter Drive” raised \$1,100 for HUGS Hawaii. In October, the ELC led the entire school in creating handmade thank you cards for Hawaii’s healthcare workers. November’s project was a canned food drive for the Hawaii Food Bank.

On Dec. 11, St. Joseph School, Waipahu, opened its first virtual Christmas program with the words, “This school year has been a journey of uncertainty, discomfort, new challenges and blessings we may not yet acknowledge.” Then the children sang, “Jesus is born, the angels said, don’t be afraid, God gave us Baby Jesus, let’s jump for joy.” And jump and twist and dance they did!

Our schools remind us every day of God’s unconditional love and protection, even in a pandemic.

Cherishing, when able, in-person support of clergy

The Office of Clergy assists the bishop by supporting the Diocese of Honolulu’s priests and deacons. The activities of the clergy office are broad in scope. Let me highlight a few.

Priestly wellness (physical, intellectual, pastoral and spiritual) are vital for happiness in clergy vocation and ministry effectiveness. The pandemic has made it challenging to meet in person for priests’ annual convocation, retreats, ongoing education, formation workshops, and social events for both active and retired priests. We have virtual meetings, but it cannot replace the benefits of in-person gatherings essential in cultivating clergy unity and wellness.

I am grateful to Bishop Larry Silva and other diocesan offices, who, in many ways, provided needed support to the clergy during the pandemic. I am confident that the clergy were resilient in adapting to the new “normal,” drawing from their “deposits” of years of formation and prayer life to navigate the unique challenges brought by the pandemic. The wellness of the clergy was part of my daily intentions in my Masses and personal prayers.

While attending to countless computer GoToMeetings are an essential part of my job, I significantly cherished bringing a few of our retired priests to their doctor’s appointments, dialysis, picking up groceries and medications, visiting and anointing them when they are sick.

Let me conclude by paraphrasing St. Teresa of Calcutta: “in this life, and most especially during the COVID-19 pandemic, we cannot always do great things. But we can do small things with great love.”

Church makes a home visit every two weeks

The coronavirus pandemic has united the world in one vast global story. No one has been left untouched. The Hawaii Catholic Herald, in its limited way, has reported a particular slice of that story.

Much of the news has been unprecedented: the cancelation of Masses including Holy Week liturgies, Catholic school classrooms transformed into sanitized bubbles, the bishop livestreaming Masses on Facebook, the pope offering a moving prayer for victims of the pandemic alone in St. Peter’s Square in the rain, Hawaii parishes turning into food distribution sites, everyone in face masks and six feet apart. The Hawaii Catholic Herald told these stories and more.

Someone once described the Catholic press as a mini-church visiting the home. The visit is all the more important now with Catholics staying home from Mass and staying away from others. With the help of local contributors and the excellent work of Catholic News Service’ worldwide network of writers and photographers, the Herald visits its readers every two weeks, and daily online, with a breadth of Catholic content.

The Herald continues to increase its presence. While its flagship product for the past 80 years has been the newsprint edition, the paper has expanded its reach into the cyber-world with a website, a digital version and social media presence.

The Hawaii Catholic Herald cannot accomplish its mission without the support of the bishop, island pastors, clergy and religious, and the Catholic laity. This generous backing makes it possible to produce, print and distribute the newspaper with a small staff of four. The Herald staff is forever grateful for the awesome privilege of being welcomed into the homes of Hawaii’s Catholics, bearing the good news in both good times and in the time of a pandemic.

Managing PPP loans and CARES Funding

Can something good come out of this crisis? What I witnessed during these challenging times is the coming together of many gifts to help our faith community. For our office, it meant using our skills to wade through the Payroll Protection Program (PPP) of the CARES (Coronavirus Aid, Relief and Economic Security) Act to find economic relief for our parishes and schools.

Your finance office applied and received approval for 66 PPP loans, ranging from one parish receiving \$1,000 to a school receiving \$2,012,600. Of the 66 loans approved, 16 entities received loans greater than \$150,000. In total, we received approximately \$10 million. The finance office conducted weekly webinars for parish and school administrators to tell them how to qualify for the forgiveness of the PPP loans.

These loans allowed our parishes and schools to keep paying their employees. During the shutdown, pastors were challenged to find meaningful work for their employees. Some parishes focused on helping our kupuna and those in need. Some pastors evangelized through social media. Some phoned parishioners to talk story and update parish records. And when the churches opened on Pentecost Sunday, more work was needed to follow CDC guidelines and keep our faith community safe.

Our parishes and schools stood tall during the pandemic. It was a joy watching the many parts come together to continue our mission of witnessing to Jesus Christ. It is an honor and privilege to serve our faith community!

Working from home, giving from home

Welcome to the New Year 2021! In many ways it will look a lot like 2020. Therefore, we must continue to adapt and use creative ways to practice our stewardship of time, talent and treasure. From the get-go, the diocesan Office of Stewardship and Development has promoted the use of electronic tools for parishes to better serve their faith communities. And now, for those watching Mass at home or the faithful who have returned to the pews, your support of your parish is just as important as ever.

Prior to COVID, many parishes did not offer online giving as a way to contribute to the offertory, second collections and special appeals. Now, more than 80% of our parishes provide this option. Yes, there are added costs — and continuous marketing is required. But this is mitigated by more frequent and larger contributions. This streamlined giving also reduces administrative work. Think about it. When you place your gift envelope into a basket, many hands transport, count, deposit and record your donation. Online giving is more seamless.

Earlier this year, the diocesan Finance Office put on the diocesan website a free online giving service for parishes. Over 1,000 gifts were received from across the Islands, raising more than \$75,000 and demonstrating the acceptance, practicality and security of electronic giving.

COVID-19 limits pastoral care to the sick

During this time of COVID-19 starting in mid-March 2020, the two chaplains, who are priests, could not do the usual rounds of visits to Catholic patients. They could only go to the hospitals if they were called, for anointing, giving Holy Communion and hearing confession for those not infected with COVID-19. They would wear personal protective equipment such as a face shield, mask, gloves and do sanitizing and disinfecting. When responding to a call, the priest must fall in line at the entrance of the hospital, distanced from others, and wait his turn to be cleared by the hospital security and screening committee. Once inside, screening, temperature testing, sanitizing and distancing are strictly observed.

The hospital ministry priests are available 24/7 for Oahu’s four big urban hospitals, Kaiser, Queen’s, Straub and Kapiolani. The visits of lay volunteers have been suspended for their own safety and health. As of now they are encouraged to offer prayers for the sick and their families and for the end of the pandemic. And it is good to note that they are updating and praying for each other. Their annual appreciation luncheon, normally in November, was cancelled due to the pandemic.

Since September, hospital ministry has had only one priest. The ministry is awaiting the assignment of the second one. In all the ministry does, may the Lord Jesus, the divine healer, heal those infected with COVID-19 and give consolation to them and their families.
