RE: Reminder: Liturgical Directives for the Obligatory Memorial of St. Damien de Veuster, ss.cc. Priest

Please see below a reprint of the texts for the celebration of the Memorial of St. Damien de Veuster, ss.cc. Priest on May 10<sup>th</sup>. The texts may be taken from the Common for Pastors: for Missionaries. This year we are celebrating his 181<sup>st</sup> birthday anniversary.

***As a reminder this is an “obligatory memorial” for the Diocese of Honolulu.***

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**ENTRANCE ANTIPHON**

Let us rejoice in the Lord for Damien, servant of God  
and servant of humanity, whose compassionate love  
and care for the suffering and the forsaken  
has given him a place among the blessed.

**OPENING PRAYER:**

Father of mercy,  
who gave us in Saint Damien  
a shining witness of love for the poorest  
and most abandoned,  
grant that, by his intercession,  
as faithful witnesses of the heart of your Son  
Jesus,  
we too may be servants of the most needy  
and rejected.  
Through our Lord Jesus Christ, your Son,  
who lives and reigns with you  
in the unity of the Holy Spirit,  
God, for ever and ever.

**FIRST READING:**

*A reading from the letter of Paul to the Romans (Rom 5, 1-8)*

Through our Lord Jesus Christ, by faith we are judged righteous and at peace with God, since it is by faith and through Jesus that we have entered this state of grace in which we can boast about looking forward to God's glory. But that is not all we can boast about; we can boast about our sufferings. These sufferings bring patience, as we know, and patience brings perseverance, and perseverance brings hope, and this hope is not deceptive because the love of God has been poured into our hearts by the Holy Spirit which has been given us. We were still helpless when at his appointed moment Christ died for sinful men. It is not easy to die even for a good man - though of course for someone really worthy, a man might be prepared to die - but what proves that God loves us is that Christ died for us while we were still sinners.

And there are other sheep I have that are not of this fold, and these I have to lead as well. They too will listen to my voice, and there will be only one flock, and one shepherd. The

*A reading from the holy Gospel according to John: Jn 13:1-5. 12-17*

Before the feast of Passover, Jesus knew that his hour had come to pass from this world to the Father. He loved his own in the world and he loved them to the end. The devil had already induced Judas, son of Simon the Iscariot, to hand him over. So, during supper fully aware that the Father had put everything into his power and that he had come from God and was returning to God, he rose from supper and took off his outer garments. He took a towel and tied it around his waist. Then he poured water into a basin and began to wash the disciples' feet and dry them with the towel around his waist. So when he had washed their feet and put his garments back on and reclined at table again, he said to them, "Do you realize what I have done for you? You call me 'teacher' and 'master,' and rightly so, for indeed I am. If I, therefore, the master and teacher, have washed your feet, you ought to wash one another's feet. I have given you a model to follow, so that as I have done for you, you should also do.
